This philosophy is exemplified by the partnership between Summit Academy OIC and the site construction division of Veit Companies. Since 2006, Veit has been both an employer of Summit’s graduates and a supporter of our programs and mission. Veit complements our 20-week carpentry program by offering three weeks of training that exposes our students to the required skills and expectations for a laborer in the specialty contracting industry. Students learn what is involved with preparing a site for building construction and get the opportunity to experience excavation and utility installation first hand.



Of the partnership, Chuck Geisler, Executive Manager of Sales and Marketing, says, “Veit is proud of our relationship with Summit Academy and the results that we have collectively achieved. The partnership has created a system that accomplishes Veit’s goals of hiring qualified and diverse workers and Summit’s goals of providing job opportunities for its students. Veit remains committed to this mutually beneficial relationship and is continually evaluating ways to improve the program for all involved.”

An example of the program’s success is LeWanda Harper. She has been working at Veit since August of 2008 as a laborer in the earthwork and utilities groups. Prior to enrolling in Summit’s carpentry apprentice program, LeWanda, a financially struggling single mom, never imagined that she would be able to find a job that offered variety and new challenges as well as paid the bills. Now she works in different parts of the city on many different construction sites and feels that her new job is a “book come to life.”

Another Summit graduate and current Veit employee, Tai Larkins, thanks Summit and Veit who both played a role in giving him an opportunity to change his life after being released from prison. “I will not let either of them down!”

Recently, Summit hosted four Behind the Sheetrock events where an intimate group of guests received an exclusive behind-the-scenes tour of the new Twins Stadium and Target Field. This once-in-a-lifetime experience provided a great opportunity to engage new friends and partners with Summit and highlight Summit's existing partnership with Mortenson Construction. (Mortenson hired 28 of our graduates to work on the Twins Stadium project.)



Guests left with a commemorative Twins baseball, a first look at the stadium before it opens its doors next spring, and of course a clear understanding of Summit's mission and the impressive projects that graduates have had the opportunity to work on.

During each event, Summit graduate Joanne Hager, volunteered her time to share her personal Summit success story. Previously an unpaid caretaker for her father, after 20-weeks of training Joanne not only learned the skills to be successful in carpentry, she also lost more than 40 pounds. The combination built up her self-esteem as she went into the workforce as a concrete laborer employed by Northland Concrete and Masonry and Mortenson Construction.

In addition to losing another 50 pounds while working, Joanne is benefitting from having dental insurance for the first time. Her teeth, which had always been a source of embarrassment, have since been fixed. She also is building a retirement fund. Though she loves her work, it is a comfort to know she will someday be able to have a nest egg to retire on—something she had never before imagined.

Joanne is grateful for Summit and its supporters. They have played an important part in stabilizing her family, building her self-esteem and helping her find her place in the workforce. She was excited to play a part in Behind the Sheetrock events to introduce Summit's mission to more people in the community and serve as an example of the change that it is creating.

Student Success



Changing A Legacy

Congratulations to Dean Peters who was ranked number one in our most recent carpentry program's graduating class. As with all our students, the path that led him to Summit is unique and filled with both challenging obstacles and personal growth.

In 2003, Dean lost his mortgage company after being involved in several dubious mortgage loans. "I was egotistical, arrogant and self-serving. It was wrong. Period." Unaware that he was also fighting depression, Dean turned to alcohol and drugs which only worsened the problem. He fell into a downward spiral. "I plummeted head-first into a deep, dark abyss and I didn't know how to get out."

Dean checked himself into a VA clinic, quit using and got psychiatric help. He went from living under a pine tree in a park reserve to recovering at a friends home. Then on Feb 19, 2007—a day Dean won't forget—he went to pay a fine. He didn't know there was a federal warrant for his arrest from his past actions. When he was released on June 4, 2009, he entered back into society, "humble and appreciative."

Though ready to work, Dean was facing a bad economy. At his halfway house, all anyone could find were jobs paying at the most \$8.50 an hour. Between taxes and 25 percent of income going to the halfway house, he knew he couldn't survive. When he learned about Summit through the American Indian OIC, he got a bike and he spent the next 20 weeks riding to Summit 14 miles each way (4,000 miles since enrolling).

Dean says Summit helped him rebuild his life, priorities and "get back on my game." Dean has formed an LLC to run his own construction company but his plans don't stop there. He has written out a long-term strategic plan. "It is my turn to give back. I don't want my legacy to be that I went to jail. I want to be remembered as the man who went to Africa and built a school."

Hennepin County and Connections

For seven years, Hennepin County and Connections have been partnering with a proven track record of working hand-in-hand to assist youth in foster care down the road to independence. Due to the recent budget cuts, social workers have become overwhelmed with the number of foster care youth on their case loads. Connections is helping fill the gap and the relationship is deepening, with one goal in mind—best serving the youth.

As the old saying goes "it takes a village to raise a child." Non-profits, local businesses and corporations have taken the place of the village for these youth. In today's economic climate, partnerships need to be practiced now more than ever.
